

Monarch sightings and presentation at Cape May

On October 2, 2021, six members of MUMC ventured to Cape May Point State Park to learn about the Monarch Butterfly Monitoring Project. Rick Radis led the group. We learned about the life cycle of the Monarch Butterfly from egg to caterpillar, then chrysalis and adult butterfly. The Monarch Butterflies from the Eastern Seaboard fly all the way to Mexico to spend the winter. We watched a demonstration of the application of a tag on an adult butterfly, it was measured, and the condition and sex of the butterfly was noted before the butterfly was freed to fly away. Monarchs can fly as far as 150 miles per day! It usually takes a month for them to reach their



wintering grounds in the mountains of Mexico. Those participating in this trip to Cape May included Rick and Carol Radis, Jack and Mary Ann Scharf, Kristin Moran, and Cherry Tom.
