How do you mark the passing of time?


My grandmother used to keep a daily journal in which she would log the weather. She would note the high and low temperature, as well as any rain or snowstorms or anything of significance. I was always fascinated and comforted by her consistency when I was visiting and saw her diligently writing in her journal. It wasn't until recently I realized she did this because she lived off the land most of her life, and knowing the weather cycles was very important. Knowing when the first and last frosts were each year was critical for crops that would later be harvested and canned for the winter.

My life is very different than my grandmother's.

I remember once when I lived in the city that I had a moment of confusion where I couldn't remember what season it was because I was so far removed from nature. And even today I sometimes will rely on an app on my phone to tell me if it's raining or cold outside instead of actually stepping outside to see for myself. And I don't mark the passing of time in a tangible way

perpetually be shocked at how fast times go by. Ash Wednesday is February 22, and it begins a season of reflection called Lent. (How can it already be here?) 

Let's journey together to a new place.





LENT SERMON SERIES

To help frame our communal Lenten experience, we're using a series called "Seeking: Honest Questions for Deeper Faith." The stories that we'll hear in worship are stories that teach us important lessons about God's kin-dom. Here's what the people who crafted our series have to say about it:

"These stories are often about someone who is also seeking an encounter with the Jesus they've heard about. Nicodemus comes to him in the veil of night; he approaches a Samaritan woman at a well, he heals a man born without sight. In these stories, each person is seeking a new beginning, a different life, a deeper faith. What unfolds is an exchange filled with questions and exploration. Often, an unveiling occurs—assumptions are disrupted, a new perspective is revealed, mystery grows. Like the characters in our Lenten scriptures, we are also seeking many things: clarity, connection, wonder, justice, balance. We are seeking our calling, the sacred, and how to live as a disciple. Throughout the turbulence of the past few years, many of us are asking big guestions about our lives and our faith. We hope this series will help us unpack some of those big questions in ways that are honest and faithful. Throughout this season, we hope you will continually ask yourself: what am I seeking? What is God seeking? This Lent, we invite you to engage in the spiritual practice of seeking. We encourage you to stay curious, open, and nimble. We hope you will soften your assumptions and expand your perspectives. We pray that these questions will create a safe space to explore-to be drawn more deeply into the fullness of life, into the heart of God.




Sunday Morning Adult Study for Lent
